## Trustees Report

Almost everyday, I get a fresh reminder of something Bob would do that I wasn't aware of. The thing I remember most about Bob, besides his duties at the Chapel, was his love for the Lord, his family and the concern for missionaries and Greenwood Hills. We all miss Bob.

The functions of the Trustees are:

1. Building and grounds maintenance. This includes grass cutting, shrubbery upkeep, snow removal, heating pipe repairs, faucet and toilet replacement, changing air conditioning filters, light bulbs, upkeep on the fire alarm system and fire extinguishers, and general cleaning.

This past year, we found an innovative way to clean the lower level floors. First, the pipes needed to burst to flood the floor, then our special forces were called in to squeegee the water into the baptismal tank, thereby cleaning the floor. 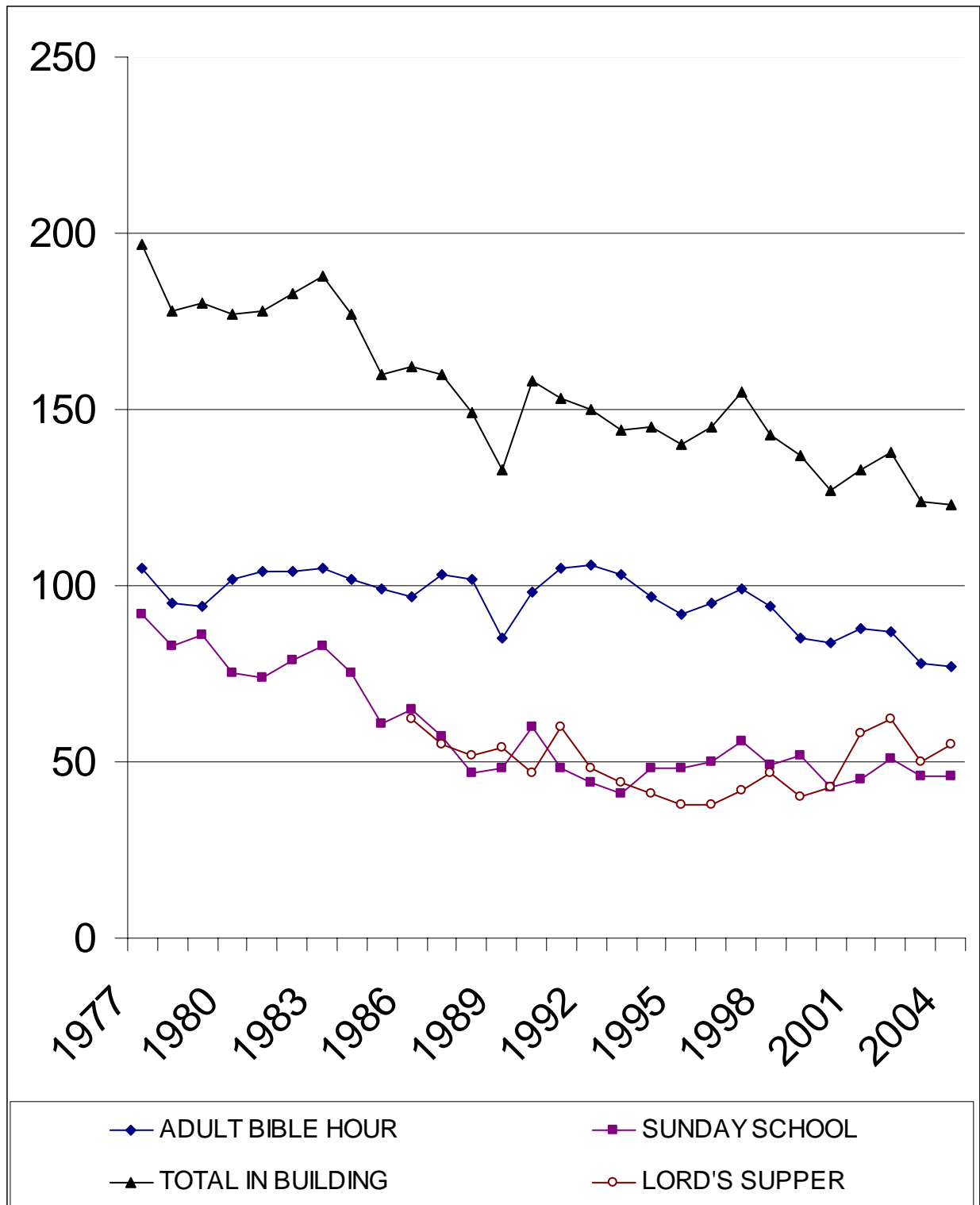

## Prison Ministry

The Emmaus courses are distributed locally, nationally and internationally to inmates and civilians. Souls are being saved and Christian spiritual growth is on-going.

Approximately 1000 Spanish Emmaus courses and 1000 English Emmaus courses were sent out this past year, 2004, to inmates in jails, prisons and half-way houses in New Jersey, with a few going out of state.

We are thankful for the financial support from the Chapel that covers the purchase of courses, supplies and all mailing costs, THANK YOU LORD !!!

Testimonies of inmates show that the courses save souls. Notes of thanks have come from inmates for the teaching and guidance the courses and the Bible provide. More than a few times inmates have written that God has saved them from death in the streets by incarceration and

then 'called' them to His Son, saving them from the second death of Rev 20:14. The bondage of sin can be broken in these difficult places.

Bibles are also supplied along with helpful Christian literature on various subjects. The Emmaus Ministry is still healthy in the face of godlessness which is growing in this age, as the Bible teaches. Questions are asked by inmates and Bible based answers are given, which at times leads to correspondence and is a blessing for both sides. Both sides need encouragement to continue on and our Lord provides.

The Spanish courses are administered by Don Dunkerton with Yvonne Duncan assisting. The English courses are administered by Walter Martin with Ben Weber assisting.

## Monthly Missionary Prayer Meeting and Supper

Once a month, usually on the first Monday, a supper is planned. The meeting changes to the second Monday in the three summer months to avoid the July 4th and Labor day holiday weekends.

On Sunday after the noon meeting, tables are set. Many thanks to many volunteers who make the job go quickly. Younger ones help greatly.

On Monday in winter months, Marian Kasperack with helpers, prepares a hot meal. In the summer the menu changes. Again she, with help, oversees the making of forty-plus pounds of potato salad. About 90 to 140 people attend for dinner. Desserts are donated by women from Kenilworth and other chapels. Chris Macmillan oversees the servers; more great volunteers help in the clear-away and others take down tables and set up the room for pre-school.

After the meal is over all assemble upstairs in the main auditorium for the Missionary Meeting.

This meeting is divided into three main segments. The first portion starts with a song, followed by an opening prayer. Then ten missionary letters are read from those in the field, also special news is shared. Then the next portion for approximately one half hour, prayer for the needs of the missionaries, by men publicly and women silently, is offered. During the start of the third part, an offering is taken. This is used to further support missionaries on the field. Most of this last section is utilized in reports from visiting Missionaries.

This meeting has been going on since the 1920' s, For many years it was held at Grace Chapel in Elizabeth, until a flood in the late 60' s made for the move to Kenilworth Chapel.

We would like to encourage more people to participate, especially younger ones. This is a good opportunity to become acquainted with many other assembly believers, and Missionaries.

## Open Air Evangelism Team

This past year the Open-air team had about six opportunities to share the gospel on the streets of New York City. We were also spreading the Word on Broad Street in Elizabeth, and Wari-nanco Park in Roselle.

This ministry is only going into its 3rd season from the K.G.C. The team consists of Don Mueller, Janet Katsch, Barb Colby, and Joe Glinka.

Great evangelists are not needed, only bold Christians who desire to share their testimonies, hand out tracts, and look to talk to people about spiritual realities.

Those interested in helping are recommended to use disposable dishes, a supply of which will be available at the chapel in the kitchen area. Meals are to be dropped off at a designated time (Chris

or Laurie will have that information). It is also recommended that visits be limited to 10 minutes. Information regarding dietary restrictions, food preferences, portion size (family size), time of delivery, and whether to bring hot and ready to serve or food to be heated later will be provided.

While the service is available, help was requested only for one family last year.

It is our hope that God would be glorified as we help our brothers and sisters in their time of need.

This was further discussed and developed in the Fall, where teachers continued to contribute to outlining our Sunday Schools' needs and possible solutions. ## Junior and Senior High Youth Groups

The 2004 Youth Group year was another blessing for both leaders and teens. This is the third year that we have been running the groups and each year brings a renewed love of the kids and the desire to see God in their lives. The Junior and Senior High groups are both held on Friday nights from 7-10pm at the chapel (unless a special event has been planned). The Junior High group is for those kids that are in grades 6 through 8, and meets on the first and third Fridays of every month. Senior High is for grades 9 through 12 and meets on the second, third and fourth Fridays. This means that the groups meet together once a month. This is the second year that we have combined the two groups on the third Friday. Even though it has taken a little while for them to get used to each other, the third Friday boasts our biggest turnouts for both groups. In September, we were amazed and blessed to see that the number of kids had grown to almost double the amount of the year before and we continued to see many new faces each month.

The meetings consist of many different activities which include movies, board games, group games, cooking and "hanging out." The combined events are a little more team oriented as the groups mix to form a bunch of teams which compete in different activities (ex. Easter Egg Hunt, Survivor Night, Festifall and Game Show Night). At some point during each meeting there is also a

devotion which helps to challenge the kids to think about how Jesus should become a part of their lives. We have been using the same teen devotional with both groups. The format of each entry uses a letter from someone their age in order to demonstrate the same type of struggles that the kids could be going through, which helps to show the need for Jesus in the life a teen. Then the devotional provides a scripture for support and a story about how Jesus can not only help them through the struggles, but also lets them know that he went through many similar trials (ex. Not fitting in His world the way others felt that He should). It then encourages discussion between the teens on the topic of the "real" Jesus and how He should be just as important to us as He has ever been to anyone else. The kids become really involved in this discussion by asking and answering questions asked by us and by the other members of the group. We have found this devotional to be a great aid in getting the "saved" kids to discuss their faith and helping the "unsaved" kids to really see the importance in knowing Jesus and encouraging both to ask questions.

We are looking forward to another year and we can't wait to see what God has in store for these groups.

We continue to use the notebook computer and video projector we purchased two years as we seek to glorify Jesus through song and preaching. ## Chapel Directory

In November of 2004 we printed our semi-annual chapel directory as a follow up to the Spring 2003 photo directory. We try to get a new directory out every 18 months or so with update sheets printed in the interim.

The directory contains the names, addresses, e-mail addresses and phone numbers of the 123 families/individuals representing 259 people who attended the chapel at the time it was being put together. Not that we should be concerned about "numbers", but I noticed that the past few years the numbers have been pretty much the same: 125/280 in 2002, 125/283 in 2001 and 126/251 in 2000. Others may have been added to our chapel family since then, or others have passed or moved away.

With the unfortunate passing of Bob Greenig, we also see the need for getting more people involved in a related area: the sound system. These areas may seem overwhelming to technophobes, but the need is not for skilled workers as much as it is for hands and bodies willing to serve the Lord in these areas. As a play director used to tell the students in his plays, there's no small parts, just small actors.

The more people who get involved, the lighter each person's responsibility will be.

I strongly recommend that a committee (or something to that effect) be organized to take charge of this area. Too many times we're wondering who has the keys to the projector or who has the keys to the sound closet. God is a God of order, not disorder. There needs to be a group of men and women, not just three or four as is the case now, who not only know how to use the systems, but also to take turns in the responsibility of running these technologies week after week at the chapel and training new helpers on a regular basis.
